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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

With the emergence of the state in Nepal, Customs administration has existed in one form or another and Customs duty has been found to be the main source of state operation. During the *Lichhavi* period, there was an arrangement to determine the fee of the *DRANGA*¹ in various places and make the clearance by determining the fee for the goods sent out of the *DRANGA* or brought in the *DRANGA*. During the *Malla* period, many Customs posts and security posts were set up in important areas from *Tibet* to the *Terai* for Customs clearance and other security purposes. Even after *Prithvi Narayan Shah's* victory over the *Kathmandu* Valley, the method of collecting Customs duty was of two types, namely, *Amanat* (deposit) and *Izara* (lease). To institutionalize the Customs administration in Nepal, *Chandra Shamsher* had set up *Bazar Adda* (Market Offices) in the Terai and Customs in the hills and made arrangements for levying the same Customs duty on all. Even during the *Rana* period, Customs were collected from the contract system. After the advent of democracy, Nepal-India and Nepal-China signed trade agreements in the period up to the year 1961. During this period, Customs Offices were established near the southern and northern borders.

The year 1962 can be taken as the milestone of Customs reform. This year, the Customs Act, 1962 was promulgated to make the same kind of legal provision related to Customs. After this, the major achievements in the period up to the year 2003 include the establishment of the Department of Customs in 1965, the new Customs Regulations in 1970, use of the classification of goods as per the CCCN system formulated by the World Customs Organization from 1980/1981 onwards and use of the harmonized system from the year 1991/92, recognition of transaction value in Customs Act 1962 etc.

Five phases of the Customs Reform and Modernization Plan, which started from the Three-Year (2003/04-2005/06) Action Plan in 2003, has been implemented till July 15, 2021. Some important achievements in this period include the implementation of the WTO valuation agreement and formulation and implementation Customs Regulations, 2064 in accordance with the new Customs Act, 2007 covering few international best practices, formation of Trade Facilitation Committee in the DOC and Customs Offices, implementation of different modules of the Asycuda World (AW), operation of Dry Port Customs, Operation of Integrated Customs Check Post (ICP), post-clearance audit, the establishment of Customs reform and modernization section, the establishment of information technology section, removal of manuscript SAD and started issuing SAD through the electronic system, the establishment of risk management unit in the main Customs Offices, connected internet protocol camera in the Customs Offices and the DOC and started online t monitoring of the clearance from the DOC through the internet protocol camera system, connected the DOC with the information network and started online monitoring and control of SAD in the Customs Offices, the establishment of client service desk, etc.

The Fifth Customs Reform and Modernization Strategy and Action Plan started in July 2017 has been completed on July 15, 2021. After the implementation of AW in Nepal, a solid foundation has been laid for automated Customs by implementing various modules during the Fifth Plan period and 99.8 percent of Nepal's trade has come under the scope of the AW system. The draft of the Customs Bill has been submitted to the parliament. The draft Customs Regulations are being prepared to comply with the proposed Customs Bill.

The Customs administration faces the challenge of ensuring the sustainability of reforms by advancing reforms in trade facilitation, revenue collection, illegal import and smuggling control, automated systems, physical infrastructure development, organizational development and capacity building. Amidst the challenges of a global pandemic such as the Covid-19 infection, the Customs administration is also facing the challenge of ensuring the integrity of the supply chain. Finally, the Customs Reform and Modernization Plan (2021-2026) has been formulated to transform the Customs administration of Nepal into an international level Customs administration. The plan is guided by the accepted norms and best practices of international Customs, maximize the use of information technology and facilitate trade, control smuggling and reduce revenue risk, collect fair and accurate revenue, monitor and control illegal movement of prohibited and controlled goods across borders through appropriate organizational structure and efficiency.

The vision of this plan is 'excellence in Customs services to support the economic and social prosperity of Nepal'. The professional relations of the Customs will be based on the values of excellence, responsiveness, impartiality, mutual respect and courtesy, integrity, transparency, and resilience in operations. The results framework is structured under impact, objective, outcomes, and outputs.

The five outcomes of the plan are trade facilitation, fair and accurate revenue yield, social safety and security, digitized Customs, and organizational development and capacity building. fifteen outputs under the outcomes. they are trade coordination/communication among the stakeholders, coordinated border management, strengthening risk management, voluntary compliance, fair and accurate revenue collection, effective post-clearance audit, implementing the policy and procedures in an integrated way for social safety, and facilitating the national safety, public health, economy, protection of intellectual property, environment, and social security, extension of the automated system, development, and extension of the national single window, management of foreign trade statistics, reforms in the physical infrastructure, integrity & Customs governance, strengthening management capacity,.

For the implementation of the plan, an implementation plan with a series of results chain with a detailed action plan have been formulated in a way that aligns with the results of the outcomes and outputs. Activities have been identified to implement all the outputs and tasks that have been identified to implement all the activities including the time and cost to complete all the tasks.

The implementation of the plan will reduce the time taken for the goods to enter the Customs premises and leave the Customs premises. The number of documents currently submitted for import and export will be reduced. The improvement in voluntary compliance will

reduce the ratio of additional duty and fines to the collection of total Customs revenue and increase fair and accurate revenue collection. Passenger and passenger goods checking equipment will be installed in the passenger lanes of main Customs Offices and made operational. X-rays, scanners, and other equipment will be connected to the main Customs Offices. Thematic resource persons will be prepared in the areas of classification, valuation, risk management, automation, Customs reform and modernization, and trade facilitation. Entrepreneurs will have access to services in the automated system of all Customs procedures. Customs revenue payment will be electronic in all the Customs Offices with Nepal Customs Automation System and banking facility. Paperless clearance will be implemented in the Customs Offices. This will increase traders' satisfaction and the overall OECD's Trade Facilitation Indicators' data from the current 0.7 to 1.3.

The estimated cost for the implementation of the plan is around Rs.11.34 billion or US\$ 961 million. Financial resources for the implementation of the plan will come from the Government of Nepal and development partners. The results and activities of the Customs Reform and Modernization Plan will be linked to the monitoring process of the DOC and Customs Offices.

It is expected that the revenue policy will be in line with the Customs priorities, laws enacted and implemented following the provisions of the Revised Kyoto Convention and Customs-related Trade Facilitation Agreement, and cooperation of the related agencies will be maintained in the proper organizational restructuring for the implementation of the plan, and support of the private sector and development partners will be maintained for the successful implementation of the plan.

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CHAPTER 1 - HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

1.1 DEVELOPMENT OF THE CUSTOMS ADMINISTRATION

With the emergence of the state in Nepal, the Customs administration has existed in one form or another. In ancient times, Customs duty was the main source of operation of the government. Historical evidence of the use of the word "Customs" is not available before the *Licchavi* period. One historian *Dhanbajra Bajracharya*, while interpreting the *Chapagaon* inscription of the *Licchavi* king *Shivadev*, states that the word "Customs" was used at that time. At that time, wherever there were *Drangas* (trading towns), the name "Customs" was added. The flourishing of trade with India and Tibet during the *Licchavi* period has been confirmed by fifth-century records and the Chinese narrative of *Silva Levi*. The king used to decide himself whether to charge Customs duty or not. Some of the royal decrees of that time were inscribed on the stone in the respective areas to make it transparent to the people. During this period, *Drangas* were set up at various places in the state, and along with those *Drangas*, tariff stalls were established. It seems that there was an arrangement of *Shaulkik* to determine the fee for the goods to be sent out of the *Dranga* or to bring the goods inside the *Dranga*.

During the *Malla* period, Nepal's trade with India and Tibet was flourishing. At this time, the leading person working in the field of revenue and other economic transactions was called *Bhandelnayak* or *Bhandagarik* as cited in an archive of BS 1393 (1335 AD). During the *Malla* period, Customs posts and security posts were set up in important areas from Tibet to the Terai for Customs clearance and other security purposes. The *Capuchin* priests cited that there was a Customs office in *Nesti* when coming from *Kuti* and in *Parsa* and *Hetauda* when coming from *Betiya* in India. In the latter part of the *Malla* period, Nepal was divided into more than fifty states and the *Malla* kings had their own central Customs Offices. Even then, since the main source of income for the king and the state was Customs, the *Malla* kings made policies on how to collect Customs. At that time, Customs were collected from government employees at the center and from contractors in areas outside the center. Customs policy also varied from state to state.

After *Prithvi Narayan Shah*'s conquest of the Kathmandu Valley in 1767/68 AD, the modern era is believed to have begun in the history of Nepal. *Prithvi Narayan Shah* made Kathmandu the capital and started conducting all the work of state administration from here. *Prithvi Narayan Shah* had adopted a policy of protecting Nepal's trade with Tibet from British India and preventing the British from entering Nepal. *Prithvi Narayan Shah* and *Bhimsen Thapa* had adopted a policy of increasing the export of goods from Nepal and discouraging the import of foreign goods into Nepal. In the early *Shah* period, the focus of the kings was more on state unification than trade. As in the *Malla* period, the system of collecting Customs duty at this time was of two types namely *Amanat* (deposit) and *Izara* (contract).

During the Jung Bahadur period, there was a Customs Office at the center, which collected Customs duty on goods coming from *Raxaul* to Kathmandu. Customs posts were set up at *Kuti, Kodari, Rasuwagadhi, Timure Syaphru,* and other places to collect Customs duty on exports and imports from the north. Revenue from *Bhot* Customs accounted for a large share of the country's total revenue. *Chandra Shamsher* had institutionalized the Customs administration in Nepal. In his time, *Bazar Adda* (market offices) was established in the Terai and Customs in the hills and the

same Customs duty was levied on all. During the *Rana* period, Customs and market duties were also levied on the goods of internal trade through a contract system. Customs duty was levied through *Izara* and *Amanat* systems. For this, Kathmandu *Goshwara* Customs, *Matatirtha Chhoti* Customs, and *Chisapani Gadhi* Customs used to work on *Amanat*. Even at this time, the main source of revenue was Customs duty.

After the end of the Rana rule in 1949 AD, Nepal's share of foreign trade with India began to increase. Trade agreements were signed between Nepal and India in 1950, 1960, 1971 AD, and beyond. Similarly, trade agreements were signed between Nepal and China in 1956, 1968, 1974, 1977, 1980 AD, and beyond. These treaties organized and expanded trade between the two countries. According to the trade agreement signed with India in 1950 AD, Customs Offices were established in five places near the Indian border, including Biratnagar, Janakpur, Birguni, Bhairahawa and Nepalguni in 1951 AD. To manage the Customs administration, a temporary Tax Collection Act was issued in 1954 AD. In the course of organizational reform of the Customs administration, the Bhansar Adda (Customs station) and the Bazar Adda (market offices) were merged on July 24, 1955, and the main Customs Offices and Sub-Customs Offices were divided into three categories namely first, second, and third based on their transactions. Also, the Customs Commissioner's Office was established at the center in 1956 AD to carry out all the Customsrelated work done by the then Ministry of Finance. In September 1958 AD, the Customs Commissioner's Office was abolished and the Customs and Excise Department was established. The Nepal Revenue Service was also formed with the staff of the Customs and Excise Department. The arrangement of forming a Tariff Board and taking recommendations to determine the Customs tariff has also come into effect since this time. In 1960 AD, the Customs Tariff Rate Act was also promulgated. The international system of classification has been adopted for the clearance of goods from this time. The Government of Nepal has accomplished important work in the period from 1949 to 1962 AD to modernize the Customs administration and to organize it through organizational reforms.

A separate law on Customs did not exist till 1962 AD. Customs-related works were carried out by issuing Sanad Sawal, Istihar, Khadga Nishan from time to time. In 1962 AD, the 'Customs Act, 1962' was promulgated to amend and consolidate the separate Sanad Sawal, Istihar, Khadga Nishan of the Kathmandu Customs Goshwara, Pahad Customs and Madhes Tarai Customs Offices and the issues raised from time to time. This act was a milestone in the field of Customs administration reform. In 1965 AD, the Department of Customs and the Department of Excise were established separately. A new 'Customs Regulation, 1970' was also issued in 1970 AD to implement the Customs Act effectively. The Customs applied the CCCN system formulated by the World Customs Organization in the classification of goods from 1979/80 onwards and introduced harmonized system from 1991/92. The transaction value of the goods was included in the Customs Act for the first time by making the seventh amendment in the Customs Act 1962. Although this Act was being amended from time to time, new Customs Act and Regulations were issued in 2007 AD to enable the GON to fulfill the commitments made at the international level and to make the Customs administration systematic, transparent, and accountable to make the international trade safe and easy. In addition to the various trade facilitation measures, the Act fully adopts the WTO valuation system. The Customs administration has an important role to play in the development of the national economy, revenue collection, trade facilitation, and protection of society, the Customs Reform and Modernization Plan was initiated in 2003 AD considering its need for planned development.

1.2 PLANNED DEVELOPMENT OF THE CUSTOMS ADMINISTRATION

The Department of Customs (DOC) has gradually changed its traditional role and made the management more efficient, transparent, and service-oriented. In addition to revenue collection, the Customs administration has been introducing timely improvements in its role through planned development in line with the changes in trade facilitation, development of information technology, control of illicit trade, communication with internal and external stakeholders, cooperation and promotion of liberal economy.

The Customs has been gradually moving forward to implement its international commitments by enacting the principles of the Revised Kyoto Convention in the law, which is a roadmap for Customs reform and modernization. The DOC has been incorporating the provisions of the WTO TFA Agreement, the Revised Kyoto Convention and the SAFE Framework of the WCO within the CRMP. The modernization of Customs administration covers the principles of risk management, audit-based controls, the maximum use of information technology, cooperation with other borders agencies, other administrations, and the private sector, and the adoption of international best practices. The government of Nepal (GON) has been implementing various programs for the institutional strengthening of the Customs management to enable it to implement Nepal's international commitments and improve revenue collection.

The campaign of the Customs Reform and Modernization Plan, which started from the Three-year (2003-2004 to 2005-2006) Action Plan in 2003 AD, has completed eighteen years. The achievements of the five reform plans implemented so far are summarized below:

1.2.1 First Customs Reform and Modernization Action Plan (2003/04-2005/06)

This was the first plan of the CRMP. As a result of the implementation of this plan Improvement in the valuation system, simplification of Customs and harmonization of Customs procedures, development of physical infrastructure, risk analysis, integrity in Customs, improvement in passenger clearance procedures were achieved.

1.2.2 Second Customs Reform and Modernization Action Plan (2006/07-2008/09)

Some important milestones were achieved after the implementation of the second Customs Reform Plan. The major achievements of the plan were the implementation of the WTO Valuation Agreement and preparation of Customs Act covering some international best practices, software developed for valuation database to simplify the valuation system, international price index made available to different Customs bi-monthly, formed the Trade Facilitation Committee at Customs Offices, established separate DOC web page, compiled and published circulars related to the Customs, mobile scanner installed at the dry-port, mobilized equipped flying squads, initiated Customs clearance within two hours, prepared and implemented performance indicators, etc.

1.2.3 Third Customs Reform and Modernization Action Plan (2009/10-2012/13)

The major achievements under the action plan were ASYCUDA rolled out to *Mechi, Tatopani, Krishnanagar, Gaur,* Dry-port *and Nepalgunj* Customs, implemented Broker Module and Risk Management (Selectivity Module) at TIA Customs, the agreement signed for the construction of ICP in *Biratnagar and Birgunj*, Customs, operated Dry-port at *Sirsiya, Parsa*, Post Clearance Audit started at the Department of Customs, etc.

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1.2.4 Fourth Customs Reform and Modernization Action Plan (2013/14-2016/17)

The important achievements under this action plan were the established CRM Section and Information Technology Section at the Department of Customs, completed preparation for the Accession to the Revised Kyoto Convention, removed hand written declaration and introduced the electronically generated SAD, expanded the Broker Module to 10 Customs, extended the ASYCUDA in 5 more Customs, namely Gaur, Jaleshwor, Janakpur, Sunsari, and Sarlahi, established the Customs Intelligence Unit and Risk Management Committee in the DOC, established Risk Management Units in the main Customs, implemented risk-based clearance (Selectivity Module) in 6 main Customs, harmonized the working hours at theborder Customs in both countries, established a separate Post Clearance Audit Office, initiated the construction of the Integrated Check Posts, implemented the Performance Based Incentive System at Customs Offices, ten Customs connected by the dedicated fiber link, deployed the Internet Protocol Camera (IP Camera) Monitoring System at 4 Customs and Department of Customs, established Online Monitoring System at 10 Customs through Wide Area Network (WAN) linking Department of Customs, established client-friendly units in the DOC, Biratnagar, Birguni, Bhairahawa, Mechi and Tribhuvan International Airport Customs, developed 5 Modules to complement ASYCUDA clearance modules i.e. Agent's Module, Risk Management System, Valuation system, Data Warehouse, and Passenger Clearance System.

1.2.5 Fifth Customs Reform and Modernization Strategies and Action Plan (2017/18-2020/21)

In this plan period, a solid foundation has been laid down to automate Customs by implementing various modules after the implementation of ASYCUDA World (AW) in Nepal. So far, AW has implemented a selection system in 13 Customs Offices, a cargo vehicle entry and exit control system in 8 Customs Offices, a valuation module in 24 Customs Offices, and a bank guarantee management system in 25 Customs Offices including implementation of the revenue collection module by the bank itself. In addition, the Goods Deposit / Seizure Management Module and Manifest Module has been installed at the Tribhuvan International Airport Customs Office. Mobile App has been functional at the *Birgunj* Customs Office. Similarly, 99.8 percent of Nepal's trade has come under the AW system. The issuance and renewal of the EXIM Code certificate required for import-export can be done through an automated process and the required revenue payment for the same can be done through electronic payment.

A draft of a new Customs Act has been tabled in the Parliament in line with the Customs-related provisions of the WTO Trade Facilitation Agreement (TFA) and the Revised Kyoto Convention standards of the WTO. Similarly, formulation of the draft of Customs Regulations is ongoing to comply with the proposed Customs Act.

Risk Management Framework and "Standard Operating Procedure" have been formulated and implemented to make risk management effective in the Customs and execute risk-based clearance system.

A new building of the DOC and Tribhuvan International Airport Customs Office has been constructed and brought into operation. Similarly, buildings have been constructed and are in operation in the *Tatopani* Customs Office, *Sati* Customs Office, *Kailali* Customs Office, and *Jaleshwor* Customs Office. In addition, Integrated Customs Check Posts (ICP) of *Birgunj* and *Biratnagar* have come into operation.

Modern machinery and equipment have been installed in the laboratory at the Customs Department. The Customs Laboratory of Nepal can scientifically check the goods to solve the problem of classification and valuation of the goods coming for Customs clearance.

Entrepreneurs have been benefitted from the implementation of the Advance Rulings. Time Release Study of three Customs Offices has been completed and work has been started to reduce the Customs clearance time. A performance-based information management system has been implemented in the Customs. The Customs has carried out an 'Integrity Perception Survey' with 740 participants, including officials of private sector umbrella organizations, exporters/importers, and Customs officials with the support of the World Customs Organization (WCO). Ten Customs Offices have formulated and implemented a Strategic Plan. Nepal National Single Window System has been introduced. Relations with trade partners have improved through mutual cooperation. During the same period of the plan, an agreement has been reached with the Customs Administration of China on mutual assistance in the field of customs and similar agreements have been initiated with India and Bangladesh.

Similarly, more important achievements have been attained in this plan period as compared to the previous plans. Some activities are being implemented and some of the important activities that could not be completed in the plan period have been included in the forthcoming Sixth Plan.

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CHAPTER 2 – CUSTOMS REFORM AND MODERNIZATION PLAN (2021/2022-2025/2026)

2.1 BACKGROUND

The Customs administration has formulated and implemented five Customs reform plans since 2003 AD. Significant achievements have been made in course of the planned development in Customs reform over the past eighteen years. New Customs Act and Rules, 2007 have been issued to adopt the WTO valuation system and make international trade easier and safer. Nepal has incorporated the provisions of the Revised Kyoto Convention of the World Customs Organization and the Trade Facilitation Agreement of the World Trade Organization in its new Customs Bill. The Customs Bill has been tabled in the Federal Parliament to implement the provisions of the convention and the agreement on Customs. To make the revenue collection realistic, a detailed information network has been established and carried out online monitoring of the valuation system on the clearance of goods from the Customs Offices from the center, implemented the AW and Nepal National Single Window system to make maximum use of information technology, constructed Integrated Customs Check Posts and dry ports and brought into operation for physical infrastructure development, improving the organizational structure of the customs and it is being transformed into an officer-oriented Customs administration, and provided national and international training for capacity building.

2.2 RATIONALE FOR CRMP 2021-2026

Against the backdrop of qualitatively increasing volume of international trade, the Customs administration has a responsibility to maintain a minimum level of physical verification at the clearance through the use of risk management techniques and to facilitate trade by reducing the cost and time of the traders, on the other hand, it is important to pay equal attention to revenue collection and social society. In addition, the Customs administration faces the challenge of accelerating and sustaining reforms in the trade facilitation, realistic valuation of goods, revenue collection, smuggling and illegal import control, automation system, physical infrastructure development, organizational development and capacity building.

There is also the challenge of ensuring supply chain and introducing cross-border e-commerce as an opportunity in the event of a disaster and pandemic such as the Covid-19 outbreak. For this, the DOC should make the clearance process paperless, reduce the time required for clearance, reduce the number of documents currently required for clearance, implement electronic payment and establish a fully automated system to provide the facility to submit all documents electronically.

The Customs administration should also focus on Customs control measures, social security and safety, health, environment and consumer protection. Fair and accurate Customs revenue should be collected by controlling revenue leakage and smuggling by installing and operating X-rays, scanners, and other equipment in the Customs Offices. During this period of the plan, the main task of the customs will be to implement the new Customs Act and Regulations. The Sixth Plan has been formulated to continue the planned development of the Customs reform by addressing the existing challenges harnessing the achievements of the Customs administration in the past as an inspiration and opportunity.

2.3 VISION

'Excellence in Customs services to support the economic and social prosperity of Nepal' will be the vision of the plan. For this, the priority of the Customs will be to create a conducive economic working environment to ensure economic growth and development-friendly Customs policy and social security with the commitment to provide excellent Customs services by reducing the time and cost of the entrepreneurs.

2.4 VALUES

The Customs Administration shall establish professional relations with the business community, general public and other organizations based on the following values:

Excellence: The Customs staff will perform their job with a sense of service, dedication and excellence.

Responsiveness: The DOC will be responsive and transparent in facing and overcoming challenges resourcefully and with enthusiasm and passion for achieving the best possible results towards nation-building.

Impartiality: The operation of the Customs will be guided by fairness and impartiality.

Mutual Respect and Courtesy: Nepal Customs' working environment will be based on mutual respect and courtesy.

Integrity: The Customs officials would demonstrate high moral standards in all facets of their work to ensure objectivity, fairness, transparency and uphold public interest over personal interest.

Transparency: The DOC will demonstrate transparency in its interactions and operations to the greatest extent possible with maximum utilization of Information Technology (IT).

Resilience in Operations: Implementation of safe and orderly procedures using new technology in coordination and cooperation with other government agencies and the private sector during disaster by the DOC will help keep the supply chain intact.

2.5 RESULTS

The CRMP results framework is given below:

2.5.1 Impact

The Impact (Goal) of the CRMP is to establish a "Responsive Customs Administration'. The aspiration of the CRMP 2021-2026 will be 'Customs recognized as a modern administration that is responsive to the needs of the 21st-century traders'. The Customs procedures are directed towards paperless clearance to attain the set results. Similarly, the aim is to provide maximum satisfaction to the service recipients by improving trade facilitation.

2.5.2 Objective

The objective of this plan is to facilitate trade through the use of modern information technology tools, to collect fair and accurate revenue and increase the contribution of the Customs in the supply chain and guarantee social safety.

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2.5.3 Outcomes

The Custom has set five themes 1) Trade Facilitation, 2) Fair and accurate Revenue Yield, 3) Social Safety and Security, 4) Digitized Customs, and 5) Organizational Development and Capacity Building; fifteen outputs under the five themes, activities, and tasks for all the outputs and objectively verifiable indicators for the five themes and outputs to accomplish the desired results. A brief description of the set Outcomes is given below.

Outcome 1. Trade Facilitation:

Facilitated import and export procedures to make it faster, cost effective and more predictable.

Trade facilitation refers to the avoidance of unnecessary trade-related constraints in the Customs. Appropriate control methods will be implemented by adopting modern technologies and measures in line with international practices to remove barriers related to trade. The Government of Nepal has drafted legislative provisions and the appropriate measures and standards of the WTO TFA, General Annex of RKC, ATA Convention, Istanbul Convention, TIR Convention, WCO Immediate Release Guidelines and other international conventions for trade facilitation and submitted to the federal parliament. Similarly, the new Customs Regulations under preparation aim at reducing the number of documents required for Customs clearance including the provisions for the implementation of the new Customs Act.

To contribute to the achievement of the above outcome, the focus will be on the below-given areas.

- Promote compliance with the law to facilitate legitimate trade.
- Delays and duplication in the international supply chain such as the need to file papers and physical tests repeatedly will be reduced.
- Mutual cooperation will be strengthened between the Customs administration and traders and Customs and other government agencies to develop a justified and beneficial mutual partnership.
- ❖ The Customs Administration will foster trade facilitation and Customs policy reform through the organizing meetings and interaction programs between the border agencies at the central and local levels.
- ❖ Joint work, policies, programs and activities will be developed for the Coordinated Border Management (CBM). CBM will be formulated and implemented by the Customs administration with other border agencies to bring coherence and simplification in border procedures and to improve trade facilitation by eliminating duplication.
- Risk management will be effectively implemented by adopting international standards and best practices.

By improving the trade facilitation, the average time of the release of goods, from the time the goods enter the Customs yard to the time they leave the Customs yard, will be reduced by at least 3 hours as compared to the average figure of the baseline survey. The number of documents required for import and export will be reduced by 2 in the import and 1 in the export.

After approval of the Customs Bill prepared in accordance with the General Annex of the RKC and the provisions of the WTO Trade Facilitation Agreement to facilitate legitimate trade, the focus of the Customs will be on implementing the Customs Act and Rules. Similarly, assessment of the implementation of the Advance Rulings, implementation of the provisions of the authorized

business person, time-release study, review of the implementation status of Revised Kyoto Convention and Trade Facilitation Agreement, effective operation of client service desk and promoting the implementation of the provision of the expedited shipment will be carried out to implement this outcome.

Nepal Customs Automation System will be further enhanced for risk management while clearing the goods at the Customs. Selectivity lanes (red, yellow, blue, and green) will be operated at the main Customs Offices. At least 80 percent of the imported goods will be cleared through yellow and green lanes.

Outcome 2. Fair and accurate Revenue Yield:

Increased Fair and accurate revenue collection through improved Customs law and its compliance.

Recognizing the emerging trends of globalization, the proliferation of regional trade agreements and expanding trade, Customs administrations are required to make a concerted effort for fair, effective and efficient revenue collection. The process of efficient and effective collection of revenue has become an even greater priority both from the Customs and trade point of view. Reform of Customs administration will be at the heart of strengthening revenue mobilization in this phase of the Customs reform and modernization. All the efforts of the DOC will strive for the efficiency and effectiveness of revenue collection in compliance with rules, standards and guidelines laid down in relevant international agreements, conventions and supporting tools and instruments.

To contribute to the achieve the above outcome, the focus will be on the below-given areas.

- ❖ Legal provisions related to valuation, goods classification, origin and other revenue related areas will be implemented appropriately for fair revenue collection.
- Voluntary compliance at the Customs will be enhanced through the blending of corrective and law enforcement measures at the desired level.
- The Reliability Audit (Post Clearance Audit) will be made effective based on its credible records and trade records after the importer imports the goods and completes the Customs clearance.

To increase the revenue collection from the implementation of the Customs Reform and Modernization Plan, the annual revenue target of the Customs offices will be determined based on research and study. Information on the Customs clearance will be shared with the Customs across the border.

Along with the voluntary compliance, exporters and importers will be aware of their rights and obligations, which will increase the right level of overall compliance. Arrangement for transportation of cargo by the sealed container will be encouraged.

For Fair and accurate revenue collection, the Customs valuation of the goods will be effective and based on transaction value. A study on the effect of the Customs Revenue Exemption will be completed and reviewed accordingly. The Post Clearance Audit will be linked to the blue lane to make it more effective.

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Outcome 3. Social Safety and Security:

Adopted strategies and other measures for surveillance and other types of control over the movement of goods, means of transport, and transport equipment (containers, pallets, crates) to prevent illegal trade and trafficking of harmful items.

In addition to trade facilitation and revenue collection, globally accepted integrated policies and procedures will be formulated and enforced to ensure social security. Effective tools and information will be used to facilitate the international movement of goods and passengers and to control illegal activities.

The Customs administration will be more proactive to mitigate serious threats to the security and safety of people through the proliferation of weapons and materials of mass destruction, traffic of small arms and explosives, and illicit diversion of dual-use goods.

To contribute to the achievement of the above outcome, the focus will be on the below-given areas.

- Passenger lanes will be developed with the installation of non-intrusive inspection equipment in the major Customs Offices and the laboratory of the Customs will be modernized.
- The functions of the DOC will be focused on social safeguard. The non-regulatory functions will mainly be focused on five areas i.e., security, public health, economy, environment and society.

Passenger lanes will be functional by installing equipment in the passenger lanes of 12 Customs Offices for the clearance of passengers and belongings thereof. The coordination of Customs will be strengthened to control illegal activities as well as smuggling at the border. To assist in risk analysis of imported and exported goods, information will be received before the goods arrive at the Customs and Advance Passenger Information System (APIS) will be introduced at the international airports.

Outcome 4. Digitized Customs:

Automated all of the Customs clearance procedures.

The Customs administration has implemented Nepal Customs Automated System (NECAS) to automate the Customs clearance. This system will make maximum use of the facilities available in AW, as per the plan, to make the Customs fully automated. Automated systems are created on a modular basis. It covers the clearance process of the major Customs offices in Nepal. The Nepal Customs Automated System covers most of the export, import, and transit procedures that have to be completed in accordance with the Customs law.

At the same time, the Nepal National Single Window System, developed to enable the issuance of licenses, permits, certificates and others (LPCO) required for international trade, will be implemented. All government agencies and the private sector involved in international trade will be affiliated with this system.

To contribute to the achievement of the above outcome, the focus will be on the below-given areas.

Appropriate information technology infrastructure will be developed to facilitate trade and implement Nepal Customs Automation System in 29 Customs Offices,

- ❖ Implementation of the Nepal National Single Window System will be extended to provide all the information related to import, export, and transit to all the parties related to international trade and transit all at once and at the same point of entry.
- ❖ The DOC will be developed as the national focal point for foreign trade statistics and foreign trade statistics will be automated and published regularly.

The efficiency and effectiveness of the overall Customs management system will be enhanced by expanding the online clearance enabling the entrepreneurs with access to the Customs clearance procedures. Customs revenue collection will be electronic in all the Customs Offices with AW and banking facilities. Customs automation and data management will be enhanced through the processing of most of the declarations (export and import). Document clearance in the Customs will be transformed to the Paperless Customs Clearance in the designated Customs offices by making arrangements for physical inspection and document checking by the staff separately.

Nepal National Single Window System and Nepal Customs Automation System will be interfaced. All the concerned bodies involved in international trade will be affiliated with the Nepal Single Window System. Nepal National Single Window System will be developed as an integral part of the foreign trade by expanding it to all export and import points.

Outcome 5. Organizational Development and Capacity Building:

Improved Customs efficiency through restructuring the Customs organization.

The Customs intends to develop the organization to promote and implement modern Customs standards, procedures, and systems. The DOC has been continually reforming its organizational capacity. The next course of action will be towards enhancing the competitiveness of the Customs administration through organizational reforms.

To contribute to the achievement of the above outcome, the focus will be on the below-given areas.

- The physical facilities of the Customs will be improved to ensure the implementation of modern Customs administration and to provide a modern and efficient working environment.
- Morale will be boosted through the development of a good organizational culture and the image of Customs will be enhanced by improving its credibility and fulfilling its obligations towards society.
- ❖ The Customs administration will be developed as a professional entity based on integrity and knowledge, to ensure its sustainability, to improve the managerial capacity and leadership of the Customs, to strengthen the planning and management capacity, and to focus on change management while carrying out these reforms.

Mobile x-rays, scanners and other equipment will be installed in the main Customs with physical infrastructure facilities and scanners and other equipment will be installed in other main Customs Offices. At least 5/5 thematic resource persons will be prepared in the field of classification, valuation, risk management, automation, Customs reform and modernization and trade facilitation among the staffs who have developed capacity from the Customs.

Necessary infrastructure and physical facilities will be developed in the major Customs Offices. Public procurement will be strengthened at the Customs.

Personal performance indicators of the staff will be developed to enhance the integrity of Customs and the results will be integrated with the Annual Performance Appraisal of staff.

Human Resource Management Plan will be reviewed including short term, medium-term and long-term capacity development plan. Capacity will be enhanced based on an assessment of needs of Customs staff and stakeholders. A new organizational structure will be prepared by thoroughly analyzing the administrative and working capacity of the technical sections.

The Results Framework and Implementation Plan of the CRMP is given in Annex 1 and 2.

2.5.4 Strategies to attain the outcomes

- Increasing the use of modern technology and equipment by making necessary policy and legal reforms for trade facilitation.
- Setting functional indicators for revenue collection to collect Fair and accurate revenue.
- Strengthening the social safety by maintaining a balance between trade facilitation and control.
- Promoting the smart Customs by maximum use of information technology through sustainable management of all possible modules of AW and implementation of the Nepal National Single Window System.
- Conducting a study on organizational development, organization and management to build the capacity of overall Customs administration.

2.5.5 Challenges and opportunities

There are the following challenges and opportunities to achieve the aforementioned outcomes.

A. Challenges

- 1. Maintaining an effective balance between trade facilitation and regulatory agencies:
 - Maintain an effective coordination between border agencies, especially customs and other regulatory bodies.
 - Strengthen the legal structure and administrative capacity of the Customs to maintain an effective balance between trade facilitation and regulatory control.

2. Adhering to the standards of the World Trade Organization and the Revised Kyoto Convention:

- The operation of Customs should be regulated by the Customs Act, Customs Regulations, Financial Act and other legal provisions. Address questions of the entrepreneurs about the simplicity, completeness, transparency and predictability of these legal provisions.
- ❖ Make the Customs procedures simple and streamlined through the adoption of risk management, use of information technology, and simplification and uniformity of Customs procedures through simplification and harmonization of the Customs laws.

3. Restructuring the Customs structure to embody the concept of automated Customs:

❖ The DOC is adjusting the positions through timely organizational restructuring. Restructure the structure of the Customs through an in-depth study of the structure of technical and functional sections of the Customs to give concrete form to the concept of automation.

4. Strengthening the Customs public procurement:

 Give priority to the procurement of minimum equipment required in the Customs Offices in accordance with the public procurement plan by building the capacity of the Customs human resources in procurement.

5. Building HR capacity:

The Customs administration is losing its professional staffs with the current government transfer and retirement policy. The integration of resources available from different sources such as government and development partners are necessary to scale up capacity building initiatives.

6. Making the Customs valuation realistic:

Develop infrastructure and adopt appropriate valuation automation modules to comply with the provisions of the WTO Valuation Agreement.

7. Making audit-based control effective:

❖ Post Clearance Audit is an effective medium to maintain a balance between trade facilitation and control. The PCA is conducted to verify the accuracy of all legislative requirements in the goods declaration. Implement the PCA effectively to properly manage the collection of Customs revenue and other taxes, and trade facilitation.

8. Classify the goods properly:

To make proper declaration of goods in the Customs, the details of its brand, model, size, quality etc. should be declared correctly and the data management of international trade should be made credible and realistic, and revenue should be collected on its basis.

9. Minimizing revenue leakage:

- Illegal imports due to porous borders should be controlled.
- Control the revenue leakage by fully implementing the WTO valuation system, properly classifying the goods, effectively conducting the PCA, monitoring and coordinating with the regulatory agencies.

B. Opportunities

The following opportunities are available with the Customs administration to address the above challenges:

- The new Customs Bill has been tabled in the federal parliament to ensure trade facilitation.
- Nepal National Single Window system has been developed and implemented, all the agencies involved in international trade can be linked on one platform.
- The workload of border checkpoints will be reduced by bringing the dry port at Chobhar of Kathmandu into operation.
- The automated system has been implemented in all the main Customs Offices.
- ** The organizational structure of the Customs is being made officer-oriented.
- Physical infrastructure has been developed in the main Customs Offices including the operation of Integrated Check Posts and Dry Port.
- Risk-based customs clearance system has the opportunity to further strengthen risk management.

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- Valuation module has been operated to make the transaction value-based Customs valuation.
- PCA Office has been established.
- Coordination mechanisms are being mobilized at different levels to control revenue leakage.
- Cooperation from the development partners has been continuously received to implement the reform programs.

2.6 OUTPUTS AND ACTIVITIES

The following are the outputs to be attained for achieving the aforementioned outcomes and the activities to be implemented to achieve the outputs:

Outcome 1. Trade Facilitation: Facilitated import and export procedures to make it faster, cost effective and more predictable.

Output 1. Facilitated legitimate trade in the Customs.

The Customs has initiated steps to improve import and export processing in the Customs. The TRS recommendations have been gradually implemented to facilitate the Customs clearance procedures. The following activities will be implemented to facilitate the import and export process at the Customs to make it timely, cost effective and predictable:

Activities

- 1.1 Formulate the new Customs Regulation for the implementation of the new Customs Act prepared in line with the provisions of the Revised Kyoto Convention and Trade Facilitation Agreement.
- 1.2 Formulate new Customs manual (Handbook).
- 1.3 Review implementation status of the Customs related provisions of the Revised Kyoto Convention and Trade Facilitation Agreement.
- 1.4 Periodic review of the documentation requirements for the Customs clearance.
- 1.5 Assess implementation of the Advance Rulings to strengthen it.
- 1.6 Implement the provisions of the Authorized Business Persons.
- 1.7 Promote implementation of the provisions of the Expedited Shipments.
- 1.8 Conduct Time Release Study (TRS).
- 1.9 Develop policy and structure to facilitate export and import through cross-border e-commerce in accordance with national policy and international good practices.
- 1.10 Implement the sub-regional projects identified by SASEC Customs Sub-Group.
- 1.11 Adopt the principles and values of Gender Equality and Social Inclusion (GESI).
- 1.12 Ensure resilience in Customs clearance to maintain the supply chain in the event of disasters such as earthquakes, COVID-19 infection and other pandemics.
- 1.13 Activate the Client Service Desk (CSD) effectively
- 1.14 Make the export and import through postal parcels from the Foreign Post Customs Office safe and smooth.
- 1.15 Ensure the access of traders to all data and information of the Customs process to traders.
- 1.16 Propagate and orientate the policies related to automation to develop the ownership of the stakeholders in the implementation of automation.

Output 2. Promoted coordination, communication and cooperation between Customs and stakeholders.

Nepal Customs recognizes the principle of partnerships and collaborations. Such partnership may be between Customs to Customs; Customs to Business networks; Customs and Other Government Agencies (OGA). The Customs has to be responsive to the inputs received from the stakeholder agencies, and should not encourage a non-tariff barrier. The Government of Nepal has signed a Customs Mutual Assistance Agreement (CMAA) with the Chinese Customs Administration. The process of concluding such an agreement with India and Bangladesh has begun. Director-General level talks between Nepal and India are held annually. Similarly, there is a provision to hold high-level talks between the Customs administrations of Nepal and the People's Republic of China and Bangladesh to facilitate international trade and resolve trade and Customs issues. The Customs has been organizing meetings with stakeholders, as necessary, at the central and field levels. The following activities will be implemented for promoting coordination, communication and cooperation with the stakeholders.

Activities

- 2.1 Mobilize local and national Customs trade facilitation mechanism.
- 2.2 Collaborate among the agencies involved in the management of the supply chain at the border.
- 2.3 Establish coordination, cooperation and effective communication between the Customs administrations.
- 2.4 Exchange information on Customs clearance with neighboring Customs administration in advance.
- 2.5 Sign Customs Mutual Assistance Agreements (CMAA) with Customs administrations of trading partner countries.
- 2.6 Conduct Client satisfaction survey in the DOC and Customs Offices.
- 2.7 Coordinate and communicate with the agencies working in the border areas.
- 2.8 Intensify inter-Customs cooperation.

Output 3. Streamlined Coordinated Border Management (CBM)

Coordinated border management regulates policy reforms and procedures to enhance coordination between national and international border agencies. The Customs administration has been collaborating with the agencies related to Customs and other border agencies in line with the concept of coordinated border management. The Customs has initiated this process by organizing meetings and interactions on trade facilitation and Customs policy formulation at the central and local levels. The following activities will be implemented to streamline the concept of Coordinated Border Management:

Activities

- 3.1 Assume lead role by the Customs in coordinating border management among the agencies responsible for border management.
- 3.2 Promote mutual communication among the Customs administration, stakeholder agencies and the media.
- 3.3 Conduct Customs related education, awareness and corporate social responsibility programs in the border areas.

Output 4. Strengthened Risk Management.

Risk management determines the level of risk by identifying, analyzing and evaluating the risk of imported and exported goods. The scientific method of risk management in customs procedures and methods provides a solid basis for minimizing the potential risk of merchandise. Customs automation helps to make it possible to quickly compare and update the risk indicators by analyzing the details stated in the Customs declaration. The following activities will be implemented to strengthen Risk Management:

Activities

- 4.1 Prepare Risk Register and update it.
- 4.2 Prepare Risk Profile.
- 4.3 Prepare Risk Indicators.
- 4.4 Develop human resources for risk identification.
- 4.5 Update risk criteria in the Selectivity Module.
- 4.6 Extend Selectivity Module to additional Customs Offices.
- 4.7 Initiate Customs clearance from the blue lane (with the provision to conduct PCA).
- 4.8 Coordinate and exchange information with national and international intelligence agencies.

Outcome 2. Fair and accurate Revenue Yield: Increased Fair and accurate revenue collection through improved Customs law and it's compliance.

Output 5. Promoted Compliance Management and Voluntary Compliance.

Several reform programs will be initiated to strengthen Compliance Management. Further improvement programs are needed to develop a culture of voluntary compliance among the traders. The following activities will be implemented to promote Compliance Management and Voluntary Compliance:

Activities

- 5.1 Prepare a document of voluntary compliance criteria.
- 5.2 Enhance awareness of the stakeholders regarding voluntary compliance.
- 5.3 Implement voluntary compliance criteria.
- 5.4 Build institutional cooperation and collaboration with the stakeholders.
- 5.5 Monitor and evaluate the implementation of compliance criteria.
- 5.6 Implement the reward and punishment system.

Output 6. Collected Fair and accurate revenue.

Customs revenue collection at the Customs point has a significant contribution to revenue mobilization in Nepal. The following activities will be implemented for collecting Fair and accurate revenue:

Activities

- 6.1 Propose annual potential revenue target based on data analysis of international trade, Customs tariff rates and changes in the revenue policy.
- 6.2 Submit suggestions to adjust Customs rates in line with international commitments.
- 6.3 Submit suggestions for Customs tariff rates & export promotion and other policy suggestions.

- 6.4 Make a declaration of goods and correct classification proper.
- 6.5 Make the Customs valuation accurate.
- 6.6 Use the data obtained from the valuation module as an online valuation database.
- 6.7 Review and update the valuation procedures/manual to strengthen valuation.
- 6.8 Carry out the random check of goods based on risks to control revenue leakage.
- 6.9 Carry out direct monitoring through Wide Area Network (WAN) at the central level and Local Area Network (LAN) monitoring at the local level.
- 6.10 Promote the transportation of cargo in sealed containers.
- 6.11 Prepare and implement the seventh version (2022 version) of the Harmonized System.
- 6.12 Conduct a study on the consequences of Customs revenue exemption and submit it to the MOF for review.

Output 7. Made Post Clearance Audit effective.

Post Clearance Audit (PCA) is a powerful measure of controlling the potential risks of importers and exporters at different stages of their business. PCA or audit-based controls are measures by which the Customs satisfy themselves as to the accuracy and authenticity of declarations through the examination of the relevant books, records, business systems and commercial data held by persons concerned. The Customs has updated the manuals for Valuation & PCA to ensure that they reflect best practices, with interactions with the relevant stakeholders. PCA Office has conducted risk-based Post Clearance Audits on a minimal scale. The following activities will be implemented to make the Post Clearance Audit effective:

Activities

- 7.1 Conduct a study on the status of PCA implementation to strengthen the audit-based control.
- 7.2 Review organization structure of the PCA Office.
- 7.3 Revise the laws and procedures related to PCA.
- 7.4 Link the PCA with the risk management of the Customs by inter-agency coordination.
- 7.5 Develop risk indicators to select for the PCA.
- 7.6 Select and conduct PCA based on risk indicators to make the PCA effective.

Outcome 3. Social Safety and Security: Adopted strategies and other measures for surveillance and other types of control over the movement of goods, means of transport, and transport equipment (containers, pallets, crates) to prevent illegal trade and trafficking of harmful items in the country.

Output 8. Implemented Customs policies and procedures in an integrated and coordinated manner to support social security and social protection.

Terrorism, the proliferation of weapons and materials of mass destruction, trafficking of small arms and explosives, and illicit diversion of dual-use goods might pose a serious threat to the security and safety of people and economic development, political stability, and social cohesion of the country. The Customs administration plays an important role to reduce these hazards. The following activities will be operationalized to implement Customs policies and procedures in an integrated and coordinated manner to support social security are:

Activities

- 8.1 Construct cargo and passenger lanes.
- 8.2 Obtain pre-arrival information of passengers and cargo manifest through Advanced Passenger Information System (APIS) and determine the risk & implement it.
- 8.3 Acquire the active support of the security agencies for the security arrangements of the Customs Office and other works.
- 8.4 Control smuggling of goods across the border through non-Customs agreed routes by mobilizing joint patrols under the leadership of Customs.
- 8.5 Control revenue leakage by mobilizing interagency mechanisms at the central and local levels regularly.
- 8.6 Operate modern equipment for the goods and passenger clearance.

Output 9. Facilitated overall national safety, public health, economy, protection of intellectual property, environment and social security through Customs.

DOC functions will be assimilated into five segments Safety, Public Health, Economy, Environment and Society (SHEES). The main Customs offices will be equipped with NIIE and lab facilities. Customs command will be strengthened to better control border smuggling activities including an expected increase in the number and extent of illegal detections. The activities to contribute to facilitate overall national safety, public health, economy, protection of intellectual property, environment, and society are:

Activities

- 9.1 Establish an interface model laboratory within the Customs premises in the ICPs and Dry Port Customs Office for testing the goods to be exported and imported.
- 9.2 Enhance the capacity of the Customs laboratory to test endangered wildlife and flora, ozone-depleting substances, and prohibited and harmful substances that adversely affect the environment.
- 9.3 Increase the use of special vigilance and intelligence at the entry points.
- 9.4 Coordinate and facilitate to prevent financial investment in money laundering and terrorist activities.

Outcome 4. Digitized Customs: Automated all of the Customs clearance procedures.

Output 10. Extended automated system in the Customs procedures.

Customs declarations are processed in 24 major Customs Offices through AW-based NECAS, which covers more than 99 percent of the Customs declarations. However, the success of full automation as planned remains to be achieved. The following activities will be implemented for the extension of the automated system in the Customs procedures:

Activities

- 10.1 Extend Nepal Customs Automation System (NECAS) in the major Customs Offices where NECAS is not implemented.
- 10.2 Implement the paperless Customs clearance.
- 10.3 Implement the recommended functional and technical aspects of the AW Implementation Plan.
- 10.4 Roll out selectivity Module in the Customs Offices.

- 10.5 Roll out the gate entry module and manifest module to the Customs Offices.
- 10.6 Roll out the ASYCUDA Mobile Client App in the Customs Offices for Customs clearance through Mobile / Tablet.
- 10.7 Apply the Exit Note as a Customs clearance gate pass.
- 10.8 Implement the electronic payment system.
- 10.9 Upload the Tariff Specification Code in the AW system to automate the valuation.
- 10.10 Configure the WTO trade facilitation provisions in the ASYCUDA system as required.
- 10.11 Systematize all the Customs exemptions through the AW system i.e. the diplomatic exemption, tariff exemption, exemption as per the Finance Act, project exemption etc.
- 10.12 Implement the ASYSCAN module.
- 10.13 Implement digital signature in the Customs.
- 10.14 Extend the Bank Guarantee Management system.
- 10.15 Upgrade IT infrastructure in the major Customs Offices where NECAS has been implemented.

Output 11. Developed and extended Nepal National Single Window (NNSW) System.

The single window is a trade facilitative measure. A single window system allows the stakeholders involved in international trade to submit the required documents related to export and import, as per the legal requirements, only once on a single portal in a single entry point in a standardized format. The Nepal National Single Window System is being developed to provide services from one place so that applications, licenses, permits, certificates, and other documents (LPCO) can be exchanged through the same method and medium by linking more than forty bodies related to international trade from one place. An international consultant has been selected and continuous system evaluation and quality testing are being done to ensure the quality of this system. The United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD), the developer of AW-based NECAS and the developer of the Nepal National Single Window System are collaborating for the interconnection between AW-based NECAS and Nepal National Single Window System. The LPCO Module required to operate this system is also in the testing phase. The following activities will be implemented for the development and extension of the Nepal National Single Window System:

Activities

- 11.1 Implement and extend Nepal National Single Window System.
- 11.2 Administer the equipment required to operate the Nepal National Single Window System in the data center.
- 11.3 Interface among Nepal National Single Window System, NECAS and agencies involved in revenue collection/control.
- 11.4 Organize training to the stakeholders for the operation of the Nepal National Single Window System.
- 11.5 Provide required equipment to the agencies that will be part of the Nepal National Single Window System.
- 11.6 Integrate the agencies to be included in the Nepal National Single Window System that have their system, if not, develop separate modules to integrate them with the system.
- 11.7 Develop the NNSW system, evaluate and certify the quality of the system.

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- 11.8 Implement the system as an integral part of international trade by expanding it to all export and import agencies and points.
- 11.9 Prepare governance structure for the sustainability of the Nepal National Single Window System.

Output 12. Managed foreign trade statistics of the Customs digitally.

Timely statistics have been processed and published timely by the DOC. Daily and monthly commodity statistics of the imported and exported goods are generated.

The preparation process of automated structures including artificial intelligence and business intelligence has been started to improve the resource base of foreign trade statistics. Harmonized merchandise trade statistics among major players, namely DOC, key stakeholders, Nepal Rastra Bank, and Trade and Export Promotion Centre including dissemination of authentic national-level trade data. The following activities will be implemented for the management of the foreign trade statistics of the Customs digitally:

Activities

- 12.1 Develop the DOC as a national focal point for foreign trade statistics.
- 12.2 Form Statistics Management Unit in the Customs Offices where the AW has been implemented.
- 12.3 Collect and publish the statistics regularly.
- 12.4 Provide orientation to all the designated focal persons on automatic data management.
- 12.5 Prepare manual to manage the data effectively.
- 12.6 Develop an overall statistical data management module for long term data management.
- 12.7 Manage the recording system of sectoral revenue exemption (project exemption, diplomatic/tariff exemption, exemption as per the Finance Act, etc.).

Outcome 5. Organizational Development and Capacity Building: Improved Customs efficiency through restructuring the Customs organization.

Output 13. Developed Customs' infrastructure and physical facilities.

The Customs layout, buildings, passenger and selectivity lanes and equipment and other required infrastructures are crucial elements in the Customs. The DOC is planning to approve and implement the Physical Infrastructure Improvement Master Plan (PIIMP) and to strengthen Customs infrastructure including installation of Non-intrusive Inspection Equipment (NIIE) in the Customs. The following activities will be implemented to develop Customs' infrastructure and physical facilities:

Activities

- 13.1 Prepare and implement Physical Infrastructure Improvement Master Plan (PIIMP) on time.
- 13.2 Coordinate in the construction of Integrated Customs Check Posts (ICP) and Dry Ports.
- 13.3 Develop and expand the Customs infrastructures along the border.
- 13.4 Promote private sector participation in the construction of Customs warehouses and terminal management.
- 13.5 Acquire land for the development of physical infrastructure in the Customs Offices.
- 13.6 Construct necessary structure of the Customs buildings to improve the working environment.

- 13.7 Safeguard and manage the land and building of the Sub-Customs Offices where there are no transactions.
- 13.8 Design layout of the Customs Offices to maintain uniformity in the construction of building and location.
- 13.9 Equip the Customs laboratories with modern equipment based on scientific classification.
- 13.10 Implement the recommendations of the Customs Point and Non-Intrusive Inspection Equipment (NIIE) study report.
- 13.11 Compile and archive Customs related historical and significant documents.

Output 14. Promoted integrity and Customs governance.

The governance and integrity in Customs are important to promote trade and investment opportunities, bolster public trust in government administration and ultimately improve the well-being of all citizens. Integrity is a prerequisite for the proper functioning of a Customs administration. Integrity in Customs was initially placed on the WCO Agenda in the late 1980s to address the problem of immorality in public service and more specifically in Customs. It culminated in 1993 with the adoption of the WCO Arusha Declaration concerning Integrity in Customs, showing the willingness of the international Customs community to comply with rules governing Integrity to reduce and, eventually, eliminate opportunities for corruption. A Revised Arusha Declaration was amended in 2003 and is currently being implemented. Assimilating the declaration, the following activities will be implemented to promote integrity and Customs governance:

Activities

- 14.1 Upgrade the Performance-based Indicator Management System in the Customs.
- 14.2 Update code of conduct including ethical value recognition, meticulous regulatory provisions and monitoring of Customs staff.
- 14.3 Organize participatory interaction of the Customs Offices and DOC periodically.
- 14.4 Disseminate information related to Customs activities regularly.
- 14.5 Provide incentives to the staffs working in Customs.

Output 15. Strengthened management capacity including results-based planning of the Customs.

The DOC has been gradually restructuring its organizational structure for institutional development and organizational strengthening. The training is organized to develop staff capacity. Customs valuation, goods classification, correct declaration, and its procedures are complex. Therefore, skill development of technical and non-technical human resources is important to ensure that staff can perform their functions. The Customs Offices are the primary point of contact between the trade community and the Customs administration and, as such, staff must be well informed and well trained. The following activities will be implemented to strengthen management capacity including results-based planning of the Customs:

Activities

- 15.1 Review the organizational structure.
- 15.2 Conduct a study on the issue of adding, upgrading and abolishing Customs Offices.
- 15.3 Prepare an integrated schedule of the CRMP annual action plan, programs included in the policies and programs of the Government of Nepal, and annual programs and budget.

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- 15.4 Develop software to record the CRMP progress details and integrate with the Performance-based Indicator Management System (PBIMS).
- 15.5 Install and extend television and internet protocol camera in additional Customs Offices and enhance the capacity of Internet Protocol Camera for the management of monitoring tasks.
- 15.6 Review and implement the Human Resource Development Master Plan.
- 15.7 Build capacity in main thematic areas of the Customs.
- 15.8 Select thematic experts in the main subjects of the Customs and include them in the Pool of Experts list.
- 15.9 Provide orientation and training to the Customs Agents and stakeholders to expand their performance.
- 15.10 Ensure sustainability of the AW (NECAS).
- 15.11 Update the records of movable goods and fixed assets and staff of the Customs administration

The CRMP Action Plan is given in Annex 3.

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CHAPTER 3 - PLAN FORMULATION, IMPLEMENTATION, MONITORING EVALUATION AND BUDGET MANAGEMENT

PLAN FORMULATION

A working group was formed by the DOC on August 13, 2020, to formulate the plan. The working group facilitated the planning process. The planning team carried out an in-depth consultation with the staff of the DOC. Similarly, discussions and consultations were held with Customs officials, traders, the Federation of Nepalese Chambers of Commerce and Industry, the Chamber of Commerce, the Trade Facilitation Committee and the Customs Agents Association at important workplaces such as Kanchanpur, Kailali, Nepalguni, Bhairahawa, Mechi, and Biratnagar. Although the consultation process was difficult due to the current COVID-19 epidemic, virtual, collective and individual consultations were carried out with senior officials of the Customs administration, Customs officials, members of the business organizations and private sector stakeholders. The plan has been finalized with the incorporation of suggestions received, on the draft plan, from the department and high-level dignitaries of the ministry.

3.2 PLAN IMPLEMENTATION

The activities of the Customs Reform and Modernization Plan will be internalized in the Annual Development Program of every year. The activities determined by the plan will be completed within the specified year. The department will make necessary arrangements for the implementation by modifying the schedule so that the unfinished activities within the year will be completed in the next year.

The implementation of the plan will be reviewed every year and its mid-term review will be carried out after the two-year period of the plan.

For the successful implementation of the plan, the main Customs Offices will make their own action plan and implement it.

3.3 MONITORING AND EVALUATION

The DOC sections and Customs Offices will quarterly review the implementation progress of the plan and submit the report to the DOC. The DOC will prepare a quarterly report on the progress of the overall plan and submit it to the Ministry. A performance-based indicator management system will be used to evaluate the progress of the overall programs of the plan and a simplified monitoring format will be used for rapid monitoring of the tasks included in the action plan.

Monitoring and review of the implementation of the programs of the plan will be carried out through the regular review system of the Government of Nepal and monitoring and review of the programs with foreign aid will be carried out in coordination with the development partners.

The monitoring of the outputs and activities will cover the following:

- a. Whether or not the planned activities stated in the implementation plan have been implemented on schedule or not?
- b. Whether or not regular supervision has been made or not?
- c. Whether or not their progress in implementation is in proportion to the expenditures incurred in the annual action plan or not?
- d. Whether the activities achieved in the prescribed time cost, quantity and quality, or not?

3.4 FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

A separate format of estimated cost details of the tasks, activities, outcomes and outcomes of the plan has been prepared for the implementation of the plan.

The estimated resource requirements for the CRMP 2021-2026 implementation will be NRs 11.34 billion or USD 961 million. A necessary budget for the implementation of the plan will be provided by the Government of Nepal and Development Partners:




